The Dream is Not Dead: Democracy is Alive!



Student play at East High was moving, had message of hope

On Dec. 9, I attended the Mentors Inspiring Boys & Girls presentation of "The School to Prison Pipeline: The Stage Play" at East High School.

The event was a celebration of Black life presented through dance and rhythmic dialogue. Black students moved with energy and purpose across the stage, the "midnight" of Blackness was said to contain the vibrancy of the stars and the hollowness of invoking "all lives matter" in a country that has readily excluded Blacks from this conception was made plain.

Reciting The Pledge of Allegiance, the players ask "Justice and Liberty – for who?"

The first act is an evisceration of the systems confronting Black youth. Scenes highlight state violence at the hands of police, inadequate social supports and limited economic opportunities fueling the drug trade and gang warfare.

The second act takes place inside the school, with these issues bleeding into the classroom. What is the relevancy of Shakespeare? And is education a way out, when poverty lays so many traps, and life can end with the randomness of a misfired bullet?

Assembly member Demond Meeks, honored at the proceedings, urged those present to "Make Demands" and to "Organize." The young players echoed these themes, crying "Fix Our Schools!" and putting aside petty disputes (whose Timberlands are cleaner, whose wallet is fatter) to direct energy toward transformational change.

The players, though acting, spoke with emotion. Even when encountering microphone troubles, lines were belted out in a manner that carried them straight to the heart of anyone listening. I, for one, spent much of the night with tears of frustration and joy on my face.

One scene featured a discussion of Pedro Reyes, a Mexican artist who transforms firearms into instruments – guitars, violins, flutes and percussion. This was juxtaposed with the players' redirection from destructive pursuits to using their hands to uplift others.

It is time for such dramatic reimagination in our communities. The kids are all right. We need to listen.

HCR Cares Featured in the Rochester Business Journal:

HCR Cares receives grant to help older African Americans gain access to home health care

HCR Cares will partner with more than 125 Rochester-area predominantly African American churches to help older adults in their congregations overcome barriers to using home health care services to improve their health outcomes.



Through new grant funding, HCR Cares will expand its diverse care project to build and manage relationships with religious leaders and churches.

The project is designed to help African American residents over age 65 overcome barriers that have kept them from receiving home health care tailored

to their individual needs. This will involve increasing connections to physicians to improve trust in the health care system, making health care information more readily available and helping to address beliefs that may delay early medical intervention.

Funding for the project was provided by a \$150,000 grant, funded equally by Greater Rochester Health Foundation and The Max and Marian Farash Charitable Foundation (\$75,000 each).

Project implementation, which will begin this month, follows completion of a demonstration project with African American pastors and congregations to increase awareness of home care programs and services.

COVID-19 Resources & Guidance From New York State Department of Health

- All New Yorkers 6 months and older should <u>get vaccinated</u> and get their <u>booster</u> <u>dose</u> when eligible.
- If you are experiencing symptoms or were exposed, get tested.
- If you test positive, stay home and talk to your healthcare provider about treatment.
- Masks are still required in healthcare facilities.
- Travelers, <u>domestic</u> and <u>international</u> should continue to follow all CDC travel requirements.
