Common Ground Health's <u>My Health Story 2022</u> <u>Survey</u> data was designed to be widely shared. Agencies, nonprofit organizations, and community members often use data to evaluate and/or improve issues of health equity, and the survey data collected from a 12-county region can help them do that in creative ways.


